
• Accept praise as you would a gift. You wouldn't refuse a present, so if someone is gracious enough to pay you a compliment, don't make light of her thoughtfulness. When a houseguest says she loves your home, say, "Thank you very much. You're very kind." By protesting, "Oh, it could be better if..." and then rattling off all of the house's faults, it may seem like you're fishing for more praise—or that your guest has poor taste for actually liking it. Both are insulting.

• Compliments aren't boomerangs. When someone compliments you, it's natural to want to say something in return, but you don't have to. Responding with a "You look wonderful, too" will sound false—no matter how sincere you are, the person will think you're only being polite. Plus, you could end up volleying compliments back and forth forever.
